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HISTORY

History 6 - Mr. Mey
We are working on the Industrial
Revolution. This week we are seeing why

MATH

6th Grade: The students just took the Chapter 10 test. I am very proud of all of them and all the work that they have been putting in. We are now starting to learn how to translate simple sentences from Latin into English.

7th Grade: The students have been doing an amazing job analyzing simple latin passages in order to answer the questions that follow.

8th Grade: We have been reading the passages *Infelix* Dido and *Mors Didonis* from chapter 12 of the Oxford Latin text. This Friday the students will take their exam for chapter 12.

We are wrapping up the current projects in the art room.

6th grade: In 6th grade we are finalizing our work on our Charcoal Roman columns and creating Gothic Gargoyles out of clay.

7th grade: In 7th grade we are done with our studies of Pointillism; the birds have taken flight. Students are now creating pointillism inspired resin jewelry.

8th grade: The 8th graders, who have been studying architectural structures, have either made three drawings, creating a tryptech or they have chosen to create a 3-d house made of clay.

Science 6 - Mr. Billups/Mr. Mey



The Habit of Punctuality

From: Seven Common Habits of Very Punctual People

So, what can you learn from those who have got punctuality nailed down? Here are seven traits people who are nearly always on time share:

#1 They're realistic about how long things take

Late people tend to underestimate the time their activities take by around 25%. To start realistically estimating how long things will take, start by recording in a journal the number of minutes you spend on your routine tasks — getting ready in the morning, traveling to work, etc. Do this for all of the tasks you repeat on a regular basis. Gradually, you'll start to appreciate the actual time tasks will take to complete.

#2 They build in "buffer" time

Stop trying to be exactly on time. Instead, plan to get to your appointments a little ahead of time. Punctual people don't chance it.

#3 They embrace waiting

Of course, building in all this extra "buffer" time means that, quite often, punctual people arrive first and find themselves waiting. If this prospect freaks you out, plan on an activity to do while you're waiting.

#4 They organize

There's more to leading a punctual lifestyle than just showing up on time. The most punctual people are also among the most organized. They tend to keep their calendars up to date, avoid scheduling too many adjacent meetings, build in travel time, and consciously plan out their day for maximum efficiency (e.g. avoiding moving back and forth for meetings by trying to co-schedule appointments that need to be in the same location).

#5 They set up multiple reminders and alarms

Ever had someone arrive 15 minutes late for a meeting and heard the "I totally forgot this was happening today!" excuse? The most punctual people take steps to ensure that no appointment is missed. They set multiple reminders, alerts, and notifications to make sure that they're reminded of what they've got coming up.

#6 They set an agenda, and stick to it

What's the number one reason for lateness in the workplace? Meetings that overrun. Sometimes that's unavoidable, but only rarely. Most meetings can be kept on time by creating an agenda beforehand and sticking to it. The best clearly describe and allot a time frame for each item. Skipping an agenda item to keep to time is okay; adding to it during the meeting is not.

#7 They're not afraid to cut people off

Of course, if you're going to set time limits on meetings and discussions then you have to be comfortable cutting people off. If an appointment is overrunning and threatening to make you late for your next meeting, then end the conversation and finish in a new time slot either over the phone, by email, or as a last resort, by scheduling a new time to meet face-to-face.





WHAT ARE ...

The THE FIVE CORE HABITS OF GRAMMAR

The Five Core Habits of Grammar conveniently form the acronym NAMES, encompassing the following elements: Naming, Attending, Memorizing, Expressing, and Storytelling. By utilizing these habits, we can more effectively approach learning new subjects and nurture a natural curiosity in our children.

- Naming: The first core habit involves assigning the correct word to something. To truly grasp a subject or idea, one must first understand the basic definitions associated with it. If you're finding it challenging to teach your child a new topic, start with naming. Ask your child to provide general definitions before delving into specifics (for example, define "planet" first, then "Mercury," and so forth). By establishing this groundwork, both you and your student can advance to more in-depth discussions about the subject.
- Attending: Attending refers to distinguishing a word from other known concepts. This involves a simple compare-and-contrast activity that allows your student to recognize what something is and what it is not. Encourage your student to explore the organization of terms from general to specific. For example, what distinguishes a plant from a tree? A tree is indeed a type of plant, but not all plants are trees. Additionally, help your student identify similarities and differences among the terms they defined in the naming phase—how are pines, maples, and oaks alike? How do they differ?
- Memorizing: The third core habit, memorizing, focuses on remembering the terms defined in naming, along with the similarities and differences highlighted in attending. There are numerous strategies to assist students in committing terms to memory, such as songs, chants, or mnemonics.
- Expressing: For parents who lean towards the humanities, the next two
 core habits will be particularly enjoyable. Expressing involves using the
 body and senses to convey knowledge. Creating models is a fantastic way
 to learn since it requires careful observation of a subject before crafting a
 representation of it.
- Storytelling: Storytelling employs written or spoken words to share knowledge on a specific topic. While studying astronomy, for instance, have your student compose a short science fiction story about the planets they defined during the naming phase. Alternatively, when exploring a historical event, you and your child could reenact it in a short play, complete with costumes and roles. Storytelling often enhances our learning experience, as it reinforces foundational knowledge in a memorable and enjoyable manner, much like expressing does.
